

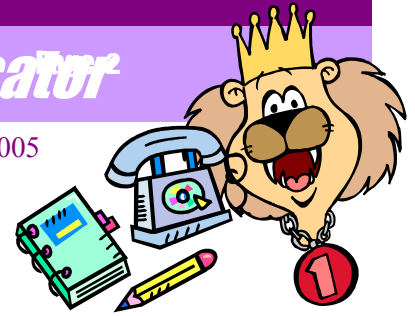

TIPS FOR COMMUNICATING WITH SOMEONE WITH A HEARING LOSS:

- * Speak up, but do not shout.
- * Speak slowly and clearly. Don't overemphasize.
- * Rephrase rather than repeat a misunderstood sentence.
- * Cut out background noise by moving away from or turning off the television or radio.
- * Face the person in good light.
- * Do not obscure your mouth with your hand or cigarette, and avoid chewing food when speaking.
- * Ask the person what can be done to make communication easier.

Goshen Lions participated in a two day public relations event at the Great American Weekend at which they made about \$300 for tickets that were sold for 4 baskets. On October 2nd, members had a hot dog cart, sold drinks and sliced apples with hot caramel topping at the Applefest as over 30,000 people converged on the Village of Warwick.

An update on the District 20-O response to the hurricane Katrina relief

effort shows that, at this writing, eleven clubs have reported total LCIF donations of \$9900 to the fund for Katrina survivors. Lions Day at the UN PROCEDURES FOR LIONS DAY WITH THE UNITED NATIONS FORM AND PAYMENT

*Registrations are processed in order of receipt.

* Registrations are accepted only if accompanied by payment. Your payment and registration form must be received at Lions Clubs International no later than February 10, 2006.

* UN security requires pre-registration. Your name and street address are required. Post Office Box numbers are not acceptable.

Provide such information for yourself and each person in your group. Each individual must have a separate registration form. You may duplicate the form as needed.

* All sessions are in English only. The public entrance to the UN Building in New York is on First Avenue at 46th Street. Registration begins at 9 a.m. The program begins at 10 a.m. Please allow extra time to pass through the security check.

Please type or print.

The registration form and payment must be received at Lions Clubs International no later than **February 10, 2006**. UN security regulations require that every person attending must pre-register by the **February 10, 2006** deadline. Only registrations accompanied by payment will be accepted. Payment must be in the form of a check, draft or money order in U.S. dollars drawn on a U.S. bank and payable to Lions Clubs International.

REFUNDS

There will be no refunds after **February 10, 2006**. There are no exceptions. Since Lions Clubs International must pay for meals and fees whether registrants attend or not, this policy of no refunds applies to all registrants, including those needing to obtain a visa and those who are not issued a visa.

VISAS

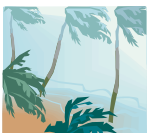
Lions Day with the UN is an event that is open to any Lion/guest from any country who pays the fee and attends the program in New York. Issuing visas is the prerogative of the consulate of any country. Lions Clubs International is unable to assist individuals in obtaining visas to attend this event.

LUNCHEON WAITING LIST

Luncheon seating in the private dining rooms is limited to 350 people and will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis. After the private dining room seats are filled, some additional luncheon seats will be made available in the UN's main dining room. We encourage early registrations to secure a luncheon seat. After these reservations have been filled, additional luncheon registrants will be added to a luncheon waiting list.

Please note: Persons on the luncheon waiting list can still attend the day program.

The names of those people on the waiting list who will be receiving lunches will be announced the morning of the program. Names from the waiting list will be called in the order in which they are received. If a person
