This is one of the most significant LCI events scheduled in early 2007. It is an event that all Lions should experience. Lions from all over the world attend.



Lions Day at the UN is scheduled for Friday, March 9, 2007 at the United Nations Headquarters in NYC. Check in begins at 9AM to

allow time to pass through security. Security requires that all attending be pre-registered.

Registrations must be received by LCI by February 9, 2007 and is limited on a first-come first-served basis, so register now. Take your Leos.

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The fee to attend without luncheon is \$60.00 for Lions and \$45.00 for Leos/students under 18 years of age. The fee to attend and include lunch with the UN Ambassadors is \$105.00 for Lions and \$90.00 for Leos.

As we enter 2007 we celebrate our 90th year as Lions. Your own local club has its Charter Night and anniversary celebrations, but part of being an international organization is that we have a

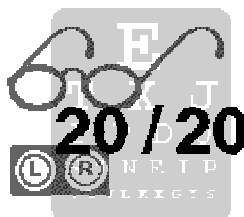
larger body to celebrate as well. We need to remember what we do as an international team and to celebrate that as well.

It seems like everyone is in a rush these days. Going to work or school, driving the kids to practice, running to a meeting or heading off to the gym...we can't slow down. While its great to be active, busy lifestyles can make it difficult to eat healthfully especially when you find yourself at the nearest fast-food restaurant eating a burger and fries. Eating high-calorie, fatty foods can lead to weight gain, raise your cholesterol and blood pressure and make it harder to manage your diabetes. Is it possible to eat on the run and still make healthy

choices? Yes!

Fast food restaurants are now offering many healthy options.

Suggestions for better choices include: plain hamburgers without the cheese and special sauces, vegetarian burgers, grilled chicken or fish sandwiches, broiled or roasted chicken without the skin, sandwich wraps made with turkey, lean ham, or roast beef, thin crust pizza with vegetable topping instead of meat, salad with low fat dressings, baked potatoes, burrito with roasted vegetables or beans or chicken, vegetable or minestrone soup, low fat milk or water, English muffins, yogurt, and fresh fruit. Lifestyles are about choices, when you're at the counter or drive through, think about healthy choices rather than choosing the poor choices that have become a habit.

Amenia Lions were pleased with the success of their 300 Club Dinner Dance with 260

people in attendance a net of \$7200 was realized by this event. In January the club is holding a "Meet The Lions" dinner meeting with each present telling about their role in the club.

Chatham Lions donated \$5,300 to Campaign Sight First II; the club also donated 34 turkeys to the local food pantry; and \$5,300 was awarded in scholarships to 8 students for the 2006-2007 term.

This Month:

Volunteerism Can Be Rewarding - Get Involved By PDG Edward M. Blodgett

Since becoming a Lion in 1964, I have had the pleasure to be involved in our primary projects of sight conservation, restoration and work with the blind. The accomplishments have been rewarding to those served, to our communities, district and to me personally. Soon after I joined, I was asked to represent the Hyde Park Lions Club in establishing the Dutchess County Lions Sight Restoration Program which initiated a local eye bank as part of the Lions Eye Bank in Albany. As a part of that activity, I became involved in eye banking, lazy eye, glaucoma and vision

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screening, assisting people of all ages receive eye exams and glasses and/or aids which improved vision and mobility.

Other activities including helping the blind and visually impaired with awareness of eye disorders, available treatments and transportation to and from eye doctors and support group programs. The collection of used eye glasses developed into a large part of my involvement.

There are times when my personal life has been affected and there are times when I should have said "no". But, if you look at the objects of Lionism, you will find the words, To Create, To Promote, To Take, To Unite, To Provide, and To Encourage which together all ways **WE SERVE** Lionism. I chose Sight; others are involved and dedicated to Speech and Hearing; and still others have committed themselves to Youth and Leo Club Activities, Diabetes Awareness, Drug Awareness, Our Youth, Our Seniors, Our Less Fortunate, Our Handicapped, Our Environment and World Peace.

In addition to asking the parents and teachers to donate their unused phones, **Zumtobel Lighting** in Highland has given permission for a cell phone collection box at their facility to benefit the fundraiser as well.

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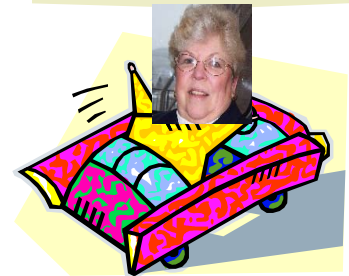
