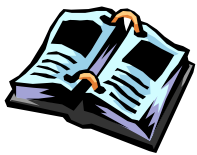

SIGHT & HEARING: WHAT WE DO BEST

In anticipation for this month's column on Sight and Hearing Groups, the following was presented to me. It was written by **Lion Bill Miller** and as I read it, I felt strongly that as we begin this new administration in our various clubs and under the very capable hands of District Governor Meggison, we should take a moment and remember that while we do what we do—volunteering our time and energies to help others—we must always be mindful of our own attitudes toward those we serve. Please read:

When asked if she would prefer the return of her sight or her hearing, Helen Keller chose her hearing. After all, it is through sound that we communicate.

As a former two term National Chairman of the Oral Deaf Adults Section (now called Deaf Hard of Hearing Section) of the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, Inc., Washington, D.C., I wish to share with you the following:

When you see things from a particular perspective as a

person with normal hearing, it affects your attitude and conversely, your attitude affects your perspective. Each contributes to your behavior in the future.

What is your attitude/perspective on learning that a person you have seen or just met is hearing impaired? Do you feel uncomfortable because you think that you may or not understand his/ her speech? Because all hearing-impaired persons may only use sign language? Because hearing-impaired persons may only have slight hearing and thus you are embarrassed about having to shout to the person? Because the deafness makes him/her incapable of being a useful part of society and thereby classified as a second-class citizen?

Chances are that your perspective/attitude is based on some or all of the above reasons. Or, is your attitude/perspective toward deafness following the positive, reality-based line of thought that:

1) The overwhelming majority of all oral deaf people have intelligible speech and that what is needed is a slight adjustment on your part, as is done when listening to a person with a distinct accent.

2) The average oral/verbal deaf person can speak easily and well: that most do not know sign language.

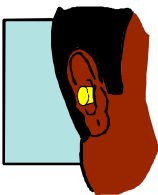
3) Those who do use signs generally do as a second language, solely for personal or professional reasons, but feel very strongly about the value of intelligible speech and use it comfortably as an everyday means of communication.

4) The average oral/verbal deaf person using binaural hearing aids or cochlear implant devices can pick up key words and some of the rhythms of speech through use of aided residual hearing, as well as lip-read skillfully enough to carry on a normal conversation with hearing peers.

5) Oral deaf people are quite capable of achieving a lofty status in life as evidenced by so many examples around us of well-adjusted, productive adults who have the same pattern of mood swings, challenges, and rewards you have in an average year.

If the above has been true, then you have undergone a most rewarding experience in meeting and knowing an oral/verbal deaf adult. You know by virtue of the person's positiveness, that his/her life has been enriched by achievement of some sort. In turn, you have been inspired and put at ease by the encounter.

As an old Chinese proverb said, "It is better to see it once than to hear it a thousand times," do come to the Lions District 20-0 and Alexander Graham Bell Association seminar at the BOCES in Goshen, NY on Saturday, September 14th, and see for yourself an exciting and very informative one.

COMINGS & GOINGS LIONS AROUND THE DISTRICT

The following information has been gathered from those secretaries who sent in Monthly Activity Reports.

Cornwall Lions cruised the Hudson River on July 3rd and Max & Harriet Sandmeier were presented with 10 year chevrons. The Club's lobster sales of just under 1,000 lobsters netted a profit of \$4,000. 100 Golfers teed off at the 5th Annual Ed Clark Memorial Golf Tournament in July at the Powelton Club and reports \$6,400 in net proceeds. A needy family from Cornwall were the recipients of food certificates through the Board of Directors.

Goshen Lions officially is at 15 members since coming into existence as a branch club of the **Middletown Lions**; they have sold 10 cases of Easter bunnies raising close to \$500, collected 87 pairs of glasses, held a 20 week club and manned the Great American Weekend Booth at Goshen's big town fair; members also

participated in Lyons (Lions) Park rehabilitation.

City of Newburgh collected 376 pairs of glasses during July. They are holding a hearing screening on August 21st at the Family Health Center at the Key Bank Complex in Newburgh. The 2nd Annual Newburgh Lions Fair/Carnival is tentatively set for Sept. 19-22 at the Algonquin Park in the Town of Newburgh. Hudson held their 11th Annual Junior Olympics on August 1st.



The sporting event for the counties youth summer playgrounds allows

competition for medals and a grand prize of a bike and helmet for the top boy and top girl. In addition, the club provided lunch of hot dogs, soda and ice cream to approximately 300 participants with the help of local donations. On August 21st the club will have a speaker from the Albany River Rats. The club was able to donate monies for Headstart which needs new car seats to transport children to educational and social activities for low income families; on August 22nd with the local Burger King they will do a BK Bash for the cause. August 24th will be a family night at the new baseball stadium that just opened in Troy (the Joseph L. Bruno Stadium at Hudson Valley Community College. On Sept. 18th, the membership will honor all members who are veterans of war at their dinner meeting.

Hurley Lions are holding their 3rd Annual Golf Tournament on



Monday, Oct. 7th at the Wiltwyck Golf Course in Kingston. They are presently looking for \$10 cart sponsors and need responses by September 16th. Kingston's SightFirst Committee held a picnic for about 20 SEEC

members. Lion members cooked and served. Expo Committee is planning booth for Business to Business Showcase at the Hudson Valley Resort in Kerhonkson on October 29th to get the word out about membership and to gain vendors for the annual Expo in March 2003.

Lumberland with a membership of 55, hopes to be adding two new members; they awarded 7 scholarships @ \$200 each; repaired benches at the ballfield



in Pond Eddy; donations were given to **PDG Ted Blair** to take for the Auction at Camp Badger for which he served as

Auctioneer. The club participated in the 1st Annual 4th of July Parade. They completed

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a BBQ Raffle with a profit of about \$1,000.

Middletown Lions served 2 adults with special needs and arranged eye surgery for a Middletown woman with cataracts; they were able to make monetary donations to the Association for the Visually Impaired, Orange Co. Sight & Hearing and the Lend an Ear Program as well as participating in the towel drive for Camp Badger. The club boasts 29 Knights of the Blind and currently has 4 Lions who transport the blind to work once a week. The club held a bottle drive in the Spring which brought in more than \$1,500 and they were able to raise \$3,000 at the Orange County Fair Booth at which 75 members participated. A handicapped student from Middletown was the recipient of a \$1,000 scholarship on behalf the club. The club joined with the **Town of Walkill Mid-Orange Lions** in the Relay for Life. Environmentally, the club held a Tree Planting at Mechanicstown Elementary, held a Fishing Derby with 100 children participating and stocked Summit Pond with 300 fish.



New Windsor gave hot dogs and soda away during the town concerts.

They are presently collecting items for their September Auction and are holding a Raffle with a grand prize of \$3,000 for which the drawing will be on September 21st. Anyone wishing to purchase a \$20 ticket, should contact Sect. Eric at 845-567-1991.

Otisville was able to award 3 scholarships. The club recently



completed their Youth Basketball Sponsorship and will begin again in September. They just took in 2 new members and are working on 2 more. A club member is working on the Peace Poster Contest with Minisink Valley children. The club was able to sponsor a local boy scout for Scout Camp. Club is busy gearing up for the Otisville Country Fair August 22 thru 25 at the local Otisville Town of Mount Hope Park. As a result of the club's fundraisers, they were able to make donations to the Youth Basketball League, Minisink Cares, the Scouts, the food pantry of the Catholic Church, Orange County Safe Homes, Albany Eye Bank, Guide Dog Program, Camp Badger, Sight and Hearing and College Scholarships at Minisink Valley. Club members will be working on a Calendar Project as well as continuing with the Lions Mints fundraiser.

Port Jervis held their Installation Dinner on July 23rd and honored 4 members with 100% attendance awards as well as 3 charter member tabs, inducted two new members and reinstated a former member. Their sight committee continues to collect eye glasses.

Stanford collected 30 pairs of glasses this past month; a food basket was given to a needy family. The club was able to make donations to Sight, Hearing and the Lions Eye Bank.

Town of Deerpark arranged for glasses for a youngster and continues to work on assistance for a family whose child needs hearing aids. The members manned a juice booth at the

Deerpark Festival which netted \$421 and they will participate in the Otisville Family Fair in August.



Town of Ulster collected 160 pairs of eyeglasses and awarded 6 scholarships. They made donations to the American Cancer Society and donated \$500 to the Ulster County Special Olympics Committee for their August games; this is in addition to the \$1,200 which the club donated for their Spring games (which covered t-shirts and food for the participants). The club is now considered "The Gold Medal Sponsor" for the Ulster County Special Olympics Spring Games and plans to do it again in 2003. The club is presently planning their semi-annual White Cane Drive in September.

Town of Wallkill Mid-Orange Lions only has board meetings in the summer months. Six members attended Family Day at Camp Badger. They held their White Cane Day on August 17th. Member Dave Bechtle led twenty-three Lions and Leos in the Orange County American Cancer Society Relay for Life.

Tri-Valley Lions collected 20 pairs of eyeglasses and provided an eye exam during July.

YOU ARE INVITED.....

Saturday, September 14, promises to be a very special day in Lions District 20-0. In a first-of-its-kind collaboration, the Lions of 20-0 will join with the New York Chapter of the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf to present a learning seminar on understanding educational and medical issues faced by deaf and hard of hearing (HOH) youngsters and their families. The seminar will be held from 9:00AM to 12:30PM at the BOCES complex on Gibson Road in the Town of Goshen. (Coffee and breakfast pastries will be provided). Open to anyone interested, we are specifically requesting attendance from all clubs in 20-0, especially club Hearing Chairs, and Lions and family and friends who have an interest in the problems confronting the deaf and hard of hearing. Of particular note – Inez Janger, the President-Elect of this nationally recognized organization, and Melody James Parton – multi-talented, multiply involved, and super energized. Seminar topics will include: Who and What is AG

Bell? How pervasive is hearing loss in children? In Adults? What is it like to be deaf? What is it like for me? A networking break to meet deaf and HOH students and their families, who will also be joining us for the seminar!

An overall objective is to eventually expand the pilot program to cover all Lion Districts in MD 20. In 1925, Helen Keller asked the Lions to respond to the needs of the hearing impaired as well as the blind, and in 1971 Lions International President Bob Uplinger declared Hearing Conservation to be a second major focus of Lionism. We have the perfect opportunity to now answer the request of Helen Keller and to further the vision of IPP Uplinger, a joint effort with this pre-eminent advocacy association for the deaf and HOH. Please carry the message to your entire membership – all Lions, family, and friends are invited. You will be proud to be a Lion and to say, “This is what we do”.
