Please monitor your own hearing for discernible volume shifts and frequency shifts. The human body has abilities and self-awareness resources that we haven't yet begun to fully utilize. Keep track of better days and not-so-good days and attempt to detect the factors that cause the change. I am noticing that there is a shift in my own hearing as far as the imbalance of seeming frequency detection between one ear and the other.

I have also recently discovered that when it comes to my (our?) inner ear and sense of balance there is a very strong influence exerted by my eyes. It's seemingly impossible to do ear exercises like we do eye exercises and exercise in other parts of the body. Maybe exercising our balance device is the most proactive opportunity that we have at our disposal. An example would be rapid rotation from one extreme to the other without losing our balance. Practice makes perfect. Keep the blood circulating around the ears.

As we live longer and longer it behooves us to do everything we can to keep our ears in good shape along with the rest of the body.

Although participation has been lower than expected, the committee plans to expand awareness of this program by visiting more Lions Clubs and Senior organizations in Ulster County and releasing additional news items for publication local newspapers. Plans are being considered to add the Speech and Hearing Center at SUNY New Paltz where people can borrow assistive listening devices. Currently, these devices are only available at Riverside Hearing Aid Service in Kingston.

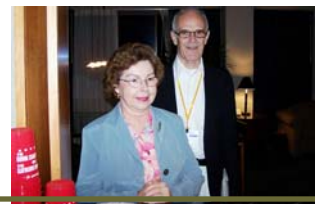

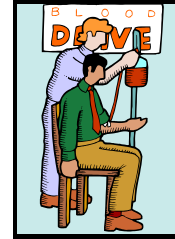
Catskill Lions made donations to American Diabetes Association, Guiding Eyes for the Blind and Camp Badger

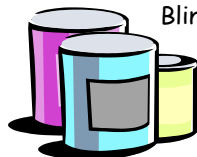
Millerton Lions held their semi-annual highway clean up.

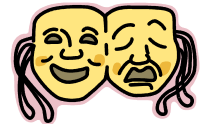

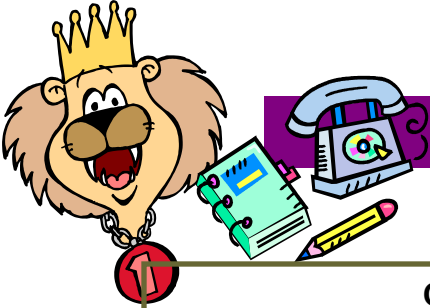
